

Willow Art Space is pleased to present THE INVISIBLE CLUE, an online group exhibition showcasing seven contemporary artists; Dylan Williams, Elias Njima, Karel Dicker, Linda Wallis, Sally Jerome, Sun Jing and Wang Zibo. The exhibition will be on view from 20 November to 20 December 2023.

While the artists' individual backgrounds and sources of inspiration are as diverse as the colors on their canvases, Sally Jerome, Dylan Williams, Linda Wallis and Karel Dicker draw inspiration from the external world. Sally Jerome, as she observes the textures and structures of cement, soil, and plants, not only discovers the hidden beauty of each object but also embarks on a journey to explore the relationship between humanity and nature. Dylan Williams finds fascination in the grandeur of mountains and hills, while Linda Wallis delves into the dreamlike scenes of everyday scenery. Karel Dicker's still lifes capture the stories told by everyday objects, which focus on a moment frozen in time, and beyond the edges of the canvas, the stories continue—the people drinking from glasses, the cigarettes being smoked—all contributing to a larger narrative. In contrast, Elias Njima and Sun Jing take us on a journey within, offering clues to the inner self through their art, capturing those fleeting moments and emotions that often elude our conscious awareness. Wang Zibo's artworks may appear tranquil and undisturbed, but this serenity happens to be the concealed clue to the restlessness within his inner emotions. Through his brush, he infuses restlessness into the pigments, using a 'whispering' approach to convey the contradictory forces between this 'calmness' and 'restlessness' on the canvas.

Each artwork is an exploration of the intersection between the tangible and the intangible, the seen and the unseen, and the ordinary and the extraordinary. The artists offer a trail of hints within their creations, inviting every viewer to follow this trail and uncover hidden wonders both within themselves and in the world that surrounds them.

Dylan Williams (1995), lives and works in London, United Kingdom.

Dylan Williams' work is consistently inspired by a deep connection to his surroundings, primarily the picturesque landscapes of Wales. His art is drawn from his lifelong relationship with the hills, fields, and forests he has traversed. By utilising the landscape as a gateway to exploring his roots beyond the visible realm, he delves into the environment's metaphysical aspects, including spirits, energy, and dreams that belong to the land. His paintings attempt to summon the meditative nature of the landscape to contemplate the transcendental, piercing through the hills to the language of the cosmos. He strives to harmonise his lived and inherited experiences with the landscape, crafting serene and subdued works with minimal paint application, echoing the tranquil subtlety of the natural world. In recent times, Williams' focus has shifted to capturing scenes from his everyday life in London, using his urban surroundings as a conduit to conjure dreamlike imagery.

Elias Njima (1994), lives and works in Geneva, Switzerland.

Elias Njima was born in 1994 to a Swiss mother and a Moroccan father. After studying graphic design in his home country, he departed to Amsterdam in 2014, obtaining a bachelor of Arts at the Gerrit Rietveld Academie in 2018.

During his time in the Netherlands, he developed his own pictural language. Mixing nearby influences (such as Léon Spilliaert or Paula Modersohn-Becker) and influences from his countries of origin (such as Marguerite Burnat-Provins, Thierry Vernet or Farid Belkahia). His work is triggered by stories in his immediate space, whether personal or overheard, as well as collective stories gleaned in literature, cinema or poetry. He often combines these stories, creating images expressing an off-putting sense of familiarity.

Since moving back to his hometown at the end of 2020, he has been expanding his research to the sculptural domain, mainly working with ceramics.



Born in 1968 in Nottingham, Linda Walis lives and works in Nottingham, UK.

Linda Wallis works primarily in coloured pencils. With a love of nature and a sense of the bizarre, her drawings teeter between the plausible and the ridiculous; a strange array of objects and shapes that appear to depict something tangible. In 2017 Wallis made a dramatic break from painting city and townscapes to focus on what she believes are manifestations of her unconscious. By reappropriating pattern, form, shape and texture from every-day and ordinary things, she fabricates an eccentric array of playful worlds on paper.


### Tired Tree




### Beach Blower








# 点朱唇

### SALLY JEROME



Born in 1990 in New York, Jerome lives and works in New York.

Through her works, Jerome explores how public places where people consciously and unconsciously share space and time represent the way we live and feel, and how generations build upon one another.

When she is outside, she observes objects (Cement, soil, and plants) that catch her eye and looks for patterns and rhythms in their textures and structures. She takes these inspirations and uses them in her paintings, adding her own imagination and improvisation. By breaking shapes down into dots, lines, prisms, or textured tubes, she reveals the hidden beauty in each object and encourages viewers to take a closer look.

Her fascination with objects is driven by unconscious impulses, religious archetypes and themes related to humanity's connection to nature and plants as symbols of rebirth and everlasting life. As she looks and paints, she seeks sanctity and wonders in an increasingly atheistic, irreverent world.



### WANG ZIBO



Born in 1986 in Wuhan, China, Wang lives and works in Beijing, China.

Wang's paintings resemble a form of collection. What he collects is not the objects he paints or the experiences he has lived through. He collects the time he spends painting these artworks; it is a collection of his own 'existence'. It is his personal and emotionally charged way of observing these moments.

'Calmness' is his mode of expression, while inner 'restlessness' is his emotion. He infuses this emotion into the pigments through the strokes of his brush. There is a line by the English poet Ted Hughes that he particularly likes: 'The whispers in the ear go farther than the loud clamor.' This 'calmness' is the mode of expression he chooses now. He wants to convey the contradictory forces between this 'calmness' and 'restlessness' by continually 'adjusting' and placing them on the canvas, using a 'whispering' approach to express his emotions. Perhaps this 'calmness' is the 'invisible' clue he leaves within his artworks.



### KAREL DICKER

Born in 1989, Dicker lives and works in Maastricht, Netherlands, where he currently dedicates his focus to the art of still-life painting. His canvases capture moments in progress, extending beyond the painting's edges and frame, where individuals partake in the act of sipping from glasses and inhaling smoke from cigarettes. Functioning like a magnifying glass, the artwork hones in on a distinctive facet of everyday scenarios.

Dicker's creations depict the narrative unfolding at the table and the interplay between the objects and their users. Within the painting, objects come to life, moving rhythmically through layers of paint, with different colours overlapping and lines intricately woven from the initial stroke to the final detail.
